1. Expostations from the Participating Organizations

- (3) Applying organizations are also expected to make use of knowledge acquired by the nominees for the said outpose.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

- (1) Current duties: be engaged in Cybersecurity policy making (such as drafting related policies, risk analysis, or protection for critical in restructure systems).
- (2) Duty positions: be director / assistance director class or equivalent level.
- (3) Experience in the relevant field: have enough knowledge of information security terminology and skills.
- (4) Language oblittees: be fluent in spoken and written English unich is equal to
 - discussions, which requires high competence of English ability. Please attach an official certificate for English ability each as TOEFL, TOEIC etc. if possible).
- (5) Health Condition: must be in good health both physically and mentally to participate in the course in Japan. Pregnant applicants are not recommended to apply due to the potential risk of health and life issues of mother and fetus.
- (6) Gender Consideration: JICA is promoting Gender equality. Women are encouraged to apply for the Program.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: available at the JICA office.
- (2) Photocopy of passport: to be submitted with the application form, if you possess your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it.

- (3) Nominee's English Score Sheet: to be submitted with the Application Form if you have any official documentation of English ability. (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC, IELTS).

4. Procedure for Application and Selection

(2) Selection

After receiving the documents through due administrative procedures in the respective governments, the JICA office shall conduct screenings and send the documents to JICA TOKYO. Selection shall be made by JICA TOKYO in consultation with the organizations concerned in Japan based on submitted documents according to qualifications. Organizations that have the intention of utilizing this course to improve their own related activities will be given priority in the selection process.

Qualifications of applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military will be examined by the Government of Japan on a case-by-case basis, consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization, and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner.

JICA and Capacity Development

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they be ong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructura, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, runal development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs are being customized to address the specific meds of different target organizations, such as policy-maixing organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and acader to notificate. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar devolopmental challenges.

Japanese Bavolopment Experience

Japan was the first non-Western between to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the case of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the "adopt and adapt" concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted analog improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese acciety to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled latter to become what it is today has emanated from this "adoption and adaptation" process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the subcess stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is matter challenging to eners with our partners this whole body of Japan's developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of "acit knowledge," a type of knowledge that carnot fally be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vasity differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of dvarcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit up, to mingle with the Jupaness people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japaness systems, as that invigration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objective.
